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Home Building Up 26%

The production of new housing in Transylvania county, over a 10-year period, has been at a rapid pace, according to cumulative figures released by the government.

A larger proportion of the local dwellings was built during the past decade than was the case in many parts of the nation.

The facts and figures on the amount of new housing in the local area and in other communities across the country are contained in reports released by the Department of Commerce. They show that home building went on at a great rate, with records being set in many localities.

In Transylvania county, some 1,358 new dwelling units were produced in the period. Taking into account the number of old houses that were eliminated to make room for new ones, the county ended with a total of 5,199 units.

This wave of construction played an important part in the local economy, providing work for people in the various building trades as well as outlets for suppliers of building materials, appliances, home furnishings and the like.

The reports show that 26.1 percent of the homes now in use in Transylvania county were built since 1950.

The upsurge of building, locally and in other parts of the nation, is attributed in part to the easier financial

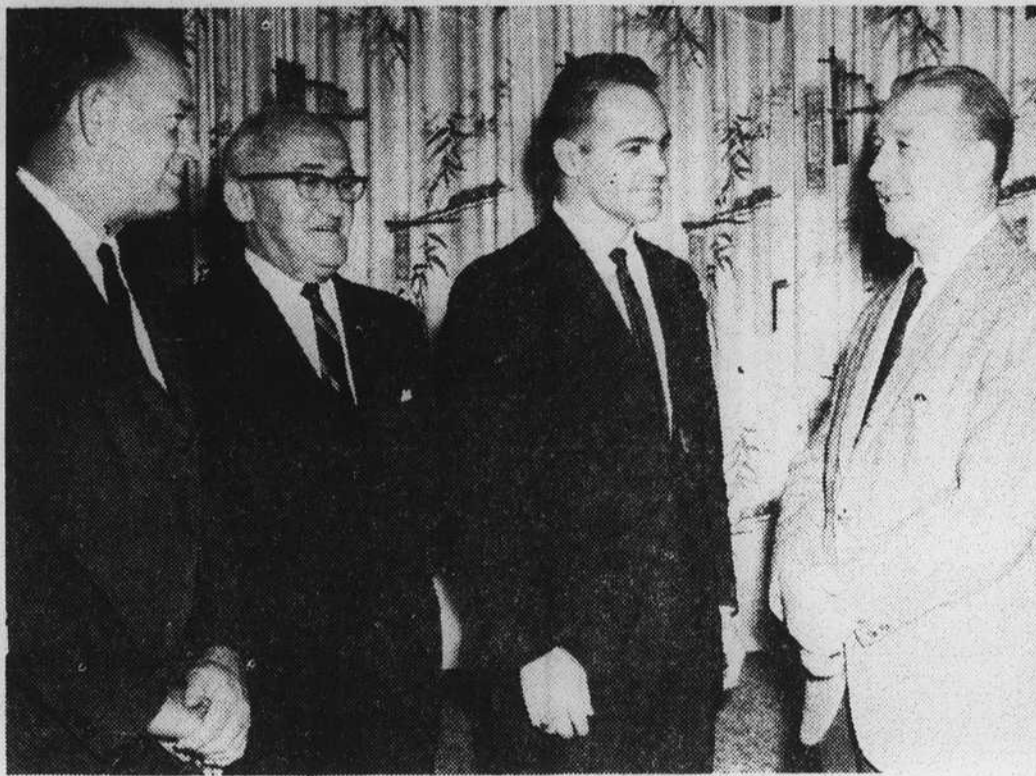

For Half Year

County's Lunchrooms Receive \$34,016 Worth Surplus Food

Transylvania county's 8 school lunchrooms through the first half of the 1962-63 school year had received \$34,016.33 worth of surplus foods from the U. S. Government.

The average number of plate lunches served daily to students in the lunchrooms is 3,061, stated Superintendent C. Wayne Bradburn, while the number of free lunches provided per school month (20 school days) is 518.

The surplus food items received by the lunchrooms this school year and the values are as follows:

Canned pork, \$2,408.00; canned pineapple \$531.00; frozen ground beef, \$2,737.52; shortening, \$397.50; canned green beans, \$322.00; corn meal, \$318.00; dried eggs, \$3,172.50; canned to-mato paste, \$462.00; dry milk, \$648.00; dry pea beans, \$297.00; canned green peas, \$373.75; process cheese, \$1,262.50; rolled wheat, \$173.60; canned sweet potatoes, \$322.50; canned pears, \$418.75; rice, \$383.50; pinto beans, \$234.00; fresh cranberries, \$285.00; canned peaches, \$519.75; creamery butter, \$7,224.00; peanut butter, \$252.70; canned tomatoes, \$387.15; frozen chicken, \$5,664.00; all purpose flour, \$1,169.00; frozen turkeys, \$3,117.61; canned cherries, \$593.75; and canned corn, \$341.25.

Supt. Bradburn said the surplus foods are distributed to the lunchrooms on the basis of average number of students served.

BREVARD HIGH — 87 out yesterday, 90 today — seems to

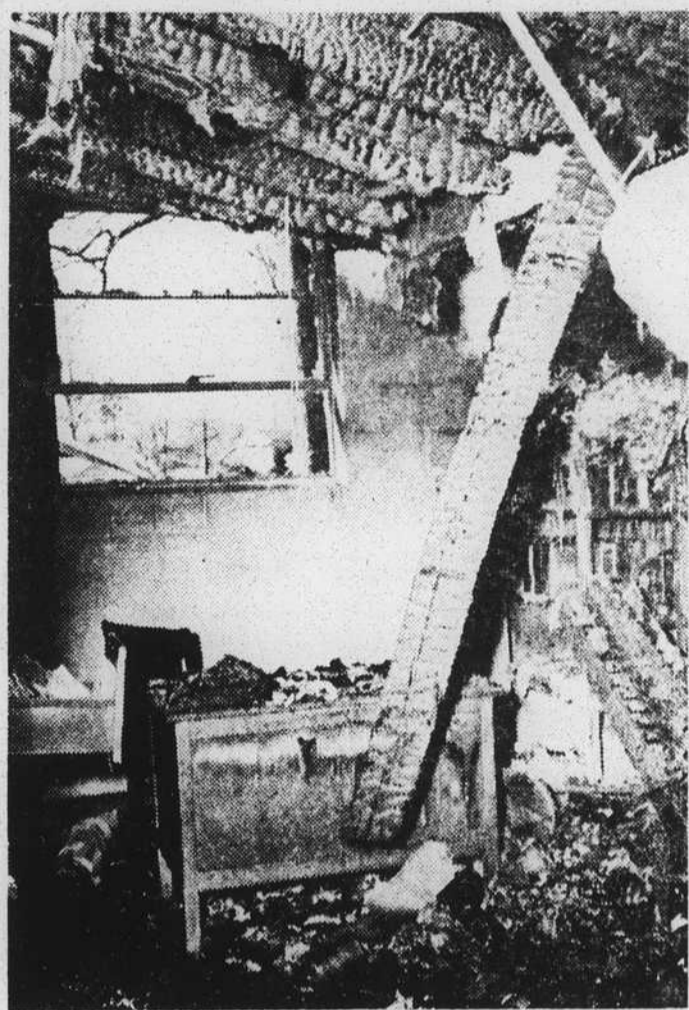
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Jury Cases To Be Heard In County Court

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Step Necessary For Upgrading Of The System

"The Transylvania County Citizens' Committee For Better Schools is proposing a county-wide election for a school supplement to be held this spring in Transylvania county," according to Dr. David C. Lea, chairman of the Citizens' Committee.

"We feel this is the required first step in order for us to upgrade and improve our schools for all students in terms of the minimum accreditation standards as set forth by the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges," says Dr. Lea.

"This proposal will enable us to hire more teachers and special personnel in order that we can spend more time with individual students. The better schools in this state have such a local supplement — this includes the Asheville and Hendersonville city systems. Our own Board of Education and school administration have worked closely with the committee to develop a sound proposal."

The proposal specifically calls for hiring 10 additional teachers which would increase the number of teachers at Rosman Elementary, Pisgah Forest, Bre-
