

Commissioners **Acquire Site** Brevard and Transylvania get a new industry this week.

It is the Brevard Manufacturing company, a division of Ruth's of Carolina, of Hendersouville.

The site is located in North Brevard adjacent to the Southern Railway tracks near the Grace Baptist church.

The announcement of the new industry comes from Harry Sampler, chairman of the Board of Trustees and Ed Wolfe, the local plant manager of Ruth's of Carolina, jointly with Wayne Bradburn, president of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce, and Gil Coan, chairman of the Industrial committee of the Brevard civic organization.

Grading of the site will begin today, and plans and specifications are being completed. It is hoped that construction of the 10,000 square foot building can be started in the immediate future.

The Brevard operation of Ruth's of Carolina will be a sewing plant ,and some 100 persons are expected to be employed initially. There are proposed increases each year.

The Brevard site is large enough for the company to expand to 40,000 square feet and the property was acquired from W. H., Wm, P. and Charles H. Burgin and Emmett Green.
