

Leonard Wants To Know The Wishes Of Public

Action has been started to abolish the Transylvania General County Court.

The law firm of Ramsey, Hill and Smart, representing Ronald Lee Whitmire, has filed a motion that would dismiss a warrant against him on the following grounds

1. That the warrant in this case be quashed for that this Court is not legally constifuted and has no jurisdiction to hear and determine this matter in that this court was purportedly established under the provisions of Section 7-266, General Statutes of North Carolina, Article 30, Chapter 7 when in fact the provisions of said section and chapter do not apply to Transylvania county, having been repealed by Chapter 1 of the Public Laws of 1931, and the attempted establishment of this court is null and void.

2. That this defendant not be compelled to answer the charge against him in this ac-

General County Court Judge Robert T. Gash is to rule on the motion. Should he rule that the court is valid, the case will be appealed to Superior Court, the attorneys for the defendant state.

He has issued the following statement:

"After discussing the problem of the validity of our General County Court system with many Transylvania people, I believe that before we act to abelish it or to validate it, we should air this matter out, study it more thoroughly, and and out more clearly what the desires and needs of our people are concerning it. The Bar Association and civic clubs could provide much help by presenting their views to the public. It may be that continuance of the General County Court is not justifiable in view of the desires of our people as well as in view of the court reform program about to begin. If it is justifiable, then the delay caused by this public study will surely be of no harm. As soon as we decide what legislative action should be taken for the best interest of our people, I will be glad to introduce the necessary
