Civil Defense Will Direct Evacuation Of All Schools

A full-scale school evacuation exercise will be conducted in Brevard and Transylvania counafternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

When the sirens sound at that time, traffic in the immediate area of the schools will be halted, and all school children will leave for their homes.

Complete instructions are released by Transylvania County Director "Buck" McCall, and Deputy Director L. C. Hall at Rosman

They are as follows:

- 1. When the official alarm is sounded, all motor vehicles in the Brevard and Rosman areas must stop in order to let the school children get started home. Parents who normally transport their children to and from school are asked to be at the school not less than forty (40) minutes before the alarm is sounded so that traffic officers can place or park them in an orderly manner.
- 2. Local children will walk randily home_taking the ronte suggested by the parents and never changing it thereafter. You must plan -Turn to Page Three

As the drought continues, daytime temperatures get more like summertime with daily highs well into the 80's, and morning lows ranging from the upper 30's into the 60's.


