(1) planning and receiving bids on four new faculty housing units

(2) constructing a new administration building

(3) renovating and converting the present Campus Center Building for the use of the Music Department

(4) increasing the capacity of the cafeteria by 50 per cent.

Plans were also made to match the \$100,000 challenge grant with an additional \$125,-000 with which to pay for the outlined capital improvements.
