




Boyd Is Quoted Chairman Of Board Discusses **Tax Matters Prior To Election**

On June 4th, 1963, the citizens of Transylvania county will decide whether or not to impose a special levy of 25c per \$100.00 for educational purposes in Transylvania county.

> As Chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, I would like to point out a few things concerning the tax val-uation in Transylvania County prior to this election prior to this election.

The present total valuation of property in Transylvania county is \$29,250,000.00 and is expected to be approximate-ly \$31,000,000.00 in 1964 prior to the revaluation of all prop-erty as required by law, which is to be completed before the end of 1964.

It is anticipated that this revaluation of property will result in a material increase in




