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## Several Nabbed In Raids

Several Transylvanians were nabbed by state and federal officers in "moonshine" raids last Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Actually, some 19 persons in all were arrested in Transylvania, Haywood and Buncombe counties and eastern Tennessee.

According to federal Alcohol and Tobacco Tax division investigators, more arrests are expected.

Taken into custody in this county were Kenneth Anders, 25, of Brevard, in Tuesday night's raid, and Jesse Willard Morgan, 23, Otis Morgan, 25, both of Rosman; Ralph Cantrell, 23, Pisgah Forest, and Ed Singletary, 59, Rosman, in Thursday night's raid.

The Morgan brothers were charged with operating a still in the Auger Hole section of Eastatoe Township as well as possession and sale of white liquor. Cantrell was charged with receiving and concealing non-taxpaid whisky and Singletary was charged with possession. A half gallon of white liquor was found in Singletary's home.

All four waived preliminary hearings before U. S. Commissioner John Ford. Jesse Morgan and Singletary posted \$300 bonds. Cantrell was unable to post \$1,000 bond on his charge and was brought to Buncombe County Jail.

Federal officers said Otis Morgan balked when agents tried to take him in tow. When the dust cleared, he faced the additional charge of impeding and obstructing a federal officer which carries a \$4,000 bond on top of the \$300 already set on the liquor charges. 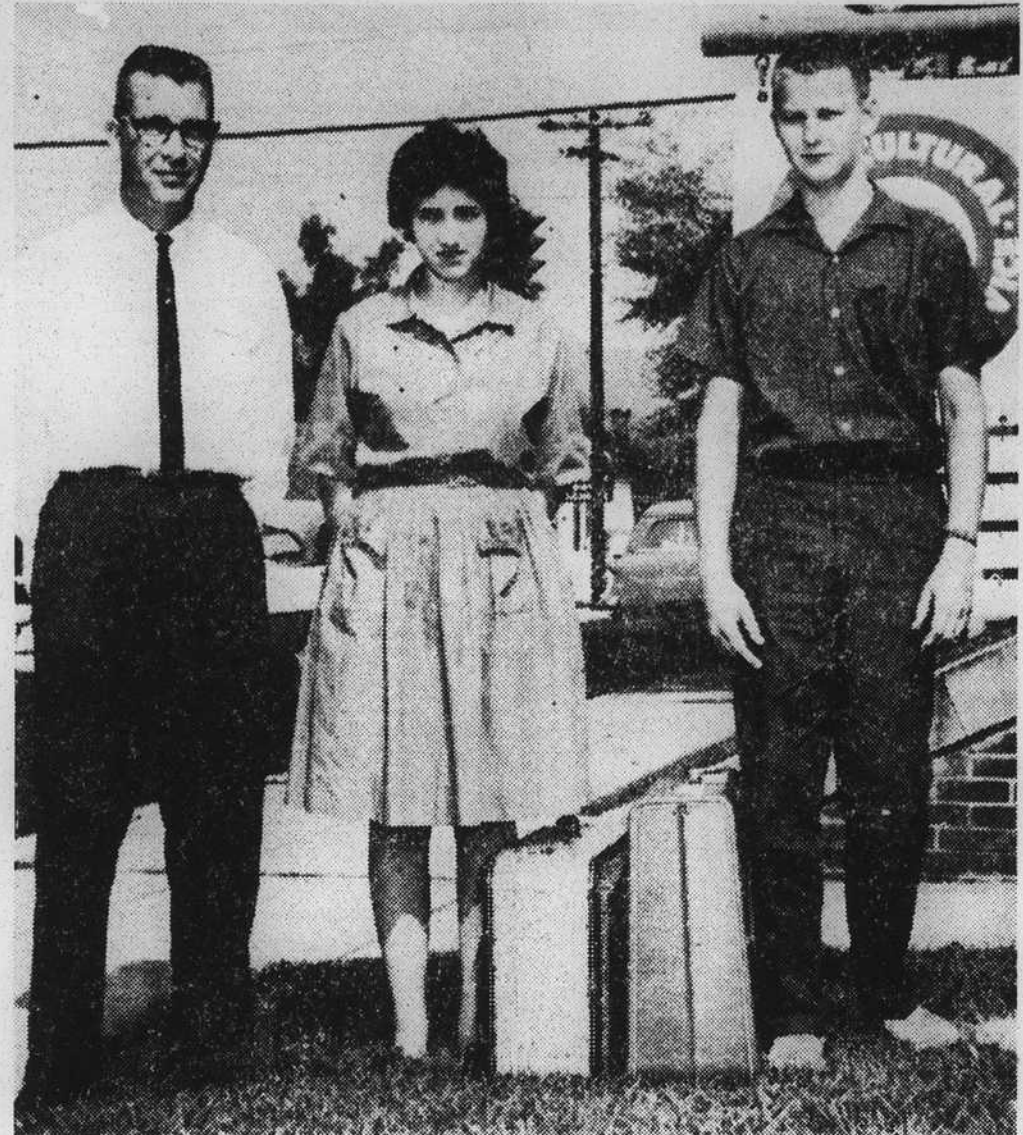

## Open For Inspection Budget Of \$261,910.10 For Town Of Brevard Is Approved

The Town Board of Aldermen has approved a budget estimate of \$261,910.10 for 1963-64, and as prescribed by law, the budget is open for inspection at the City Hall.

This compares with \$258,910.00 for the current year.

The tax rate remains the same at \$1.45, and this is divided into \$1.35 for the general fund and 10 cents for debt service. Currently, it is \$1.31 and 14 cents.

The budget is broken down as follows:

General fund	-----	\$178,165.10
Utility fund	-----	74,150.00
Emergency	-----	9,595.00
<b>Total</b>	-----	<b>\$261,910.10</b>

The revenue estimate is \$163,290.00 and utility \$98,620.00, totaling \$261,910.10.

The aldermen are expected to adopt the budget at their regular July meeting.

At their last meeting, the aldermen were given a lengthy report by Town Manager Bill Edens on the work that members of the various forces of the town had done during the past —Turn to Page Four

## Given Approval First-Citizens Bank Is Planning Local Operation

Final approval has been received by First - Citizens Bank & Trust Company for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation for the establishment of a full - service banking facility in Brevard. The announcement was made by Lewis R. Holding, president of the statewide financial firm.

Approval from the State Banking Commission was obtained by the banking institution for the Brevard office in April.

According to First - Citizens officials the bank's Brevard office is to be located on property obtained from Mrs. Lila Wenzlick.

It is expected that demolition of the structure presently on the property will begin in the immediate future with the banking building to be under construction immediately upon clearance of the property.

Mr. Holding stated that as soon as definite plans for the new banking structure are complete and available they will be made public. He emphasized that the building would contain the most modern banking facilities and conveniences available and would present an appearance of which not only the bank but the citizens of Brevard would be most proud.

## Telephone Survey Underway

## Phone Company Wins Decision

A federal district court in North Carolina has issued an injunction preventing a distributor of telephone directory covers containing advertising from continuing to send them to customers of the Citizens Telephone Co., Brevard, N. C. the complainant. The injunction was issued against Tel Service Co. which headquarters in Florida.

The court, in issuing a permanent injunction restraining the defendant from attempted violation of telephone company tariffs, used some quotable language, saying in part: "Since the provision (printed on each directory) is a part of each contract by the telephone company and its subscribers, if the defendant furnishes covers without the consent of the telephone company and invites and induces subscribers to use them in violation of their contracts with the —Turn to Page Six

## Tomorrow - Old Glory's Birthday

"Every flag in Brevard should be flying tomorrow (June 14)," urges Mrs. Vernon Wray, president of the local unit of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Tomorrow will be Old Glory's birthday and the flag of the United States will be 186 years old. The day will be celebrated as "Flag Day" throughout the nation.

"During the first part of the Revolutionary War the struggling colonies used a number of different flags but were without an official national flag," explained Mrs. Wray.

"On June 14, 1776, the Congress adopted a measure providing that the flag should be thirteen alternate red and white stripes, and thirteen stars on a field of blue. A sample flag was made by Betsy Ross at the request of General Washington it is said. The new flag became popular immediately and did much to —Turn to Page Six

## Local Persons Will Attend Pink Bed Meet

Governor Terry Sanford will bring many dignitaries to Transylvania county this weekend as state and national figures inspect the famed Pisgah National Forest and the Blue Ridge Parkway in this area.

The trip to Transylvania on Saturday will be a part of the Governor's Conference on Outdoor Recreation and Conservation in Western North Carolina.

The group will begin the event with a banquet in Asheville Friday night.

They are scheduled to arrive at the Pink Beds at 10:00 a. m., on Saturday morning, and there will be an inspection of the Cradle of American Forestry, where the Forest Service is planning to erect a Forestry National Museum.

It was at this site that forestry education was born under two pioneers, Gifford Pinchot and Dr. C. A. Schenck.

Directors and members of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce will be on hand to serve refreshments to the Governor and other dignitaries.

The next phase of the tour will be along the Parkway, and the group will travel over the newest opened section of the Parkway — a 20-mile stretch from Beech Gap to Balsam Gap, running through Tanassee Bald, from where the proposed extension of the Blue Ridge Parkway is planned to run into Georgia.
