

#### **Brad Hawkins To Conduct** Program, Audubon Colony



# Tax Collections At Record High

Tax collections in Trans high, Lawrence Hipp, tax col-lector, reported to the towns of Brevard and Rosman and county this week.

Total collections for the county totalled \$502,427.30 95.27 per cent. The charge was \$529,840.95.

For the town of Brevard collection of the 1962 tax charge was \$86,236.95 or
