

# Mrs. Larry Turner To Direct March Of Dimes Drive Locally

## Doctors' Decision

Mrs. Larry Turner of Brevard, on behalf of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, will serve as Transylvania County Director of the 1964 March of Dimes, Mr. Phil Marvin, State Representative, announced today.

Mrs. Turner will direct volunteers during the January 23rd annual March of Dimes campaign in this county to raise funds for medical care of those afflicted with birth defects or with arthritis, and to support research into the cause and cure of these crippling conditions.

In announcing the appointment, Mr. Marvin said that "I know very well that under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. Turner, the people of Transylvania will give generously again to support the March of Dimes scientific assault on these crippling conditions. In deciding the amount to give, all of us must also be mindful of the continuing need of thousands stricken in other years by paralytic polio."

Mrs. Turner will serve along with a group of board members Mrs. Marius Wells, Mrs. Ken Nissen and Mrs. James Nichol. The entire members of E.S.A. will also participate.

"Really only a few of us Americans realize," Mrs. Turner said, "that every year in our country we have a quarter of a million infants born with serious birth defects. At least 30,000 are still born or die of these defects. To put it another way, this means that one infant of every 16 has a serious defect, and that about every tenth American family experiences the tragedy and suffering caused by the birth of a seriously defective child. Only accidents cause more crippling among children."

Turning to the subject of arthritis, Mrs. Turner added: "Here also the statistics are shocking and breathtaking. Fully 11 million of us suffer from the arthritic diseases. A fourth of these are unable—or are limited in their ability—to carry out normal activities. A tenth of the victims of this Number One Crippler in the nation, or more than a million individuals, are confined to their homes or require help in getting around."

Mrs. Turner explained that with public contributions the March of Dimes has established some 70 treatment centers throughout the country to give expert medical care for children with birth defects, for people of all ages stricken by arthritis and for those afflicted by polio. Fifteen of these centers also conduct research.

Mrs. Turner stated that the Birth Defects Special Treatment Center which began operation this year at Chaeel Hill, is supported by the March of Dimes Chapters of North Carolina. Chapters are looking toward the possible establishment of a rheumatoid arthritis special treatment center in our state in 1964.



EVERY YEAR in the U. S., about 15,000 infants are born with hydrocephalus, a severe birth defect also known as water on the brain. About half that total are stillborn. Among the survivors the condition sometimes corrects itself. When it does not, new surgical techniques have greatly improved the likelihood of survival. The infant above, Joyce Elaine Deitch, 8 months, is being carefully checked by Dr. Jack R. Cooper, a neurosurgeon, and Dr. Ruth M. Yohe, a pediatrician and medical director of the March of Dimes-financed Birth Defects Treatment Center, Children's Mercy Hospital, Kansas City, Mo. They decided against immediate surgery since swelling of the head seemed to be stopping of its own accord. Contributions to the March of Dimes support the fight against birth defects, arthritis and polio.

## TOWN TALK FROM TOWN HALL

Another Christmas season has passed, and we here in Town Hall wish to take this opportunity to extend every good wish for a happy and prosperous New Year to all Brevardians. We would also like to renew our pledge to you for the best possible service that we can render throughout the coming year.

The snow that fell on the Sunday night before Christmas disrupted traffic to an alarming degree on Monday and Tuesday. These were the two busiest days of the Christmas season, and John Kipatrick was reluctant to get out and try to remove the snow for fear that the congestion caused by our equipment backing would be worse than the congestion resulting from the snow remaining in the center of the streets. It was necessary on Monday night to have several men work during the late hours and remove snow from the sidewalks and the parking areas on Main and Broad streets.

I hope that those of you who were inconvenienced by the snow remaining on our streets will understand that our actions were prompted by our interest in the greatest number of people using our streets on those two days.

Frozen water pipes have continued to plague us for the past three weeks. The protracted cold has caused frost to go deeper into the ground than it has before, and we have had to dig out and

thaw water lines that we thought would be safe even in this cold weather.

A number of persons have called Town Hall asking us to thaw their water lines. Wherever lines are frozen in the street, on the Town side of a water meter, we have been happy to accommodate our patrons. But we cannot be responsible for thawing water lines that lay on private property. These of necessity must be taken care of by the property owner. In some instances, we have had calls to come and thaw water lines that are under peoples houses, and we cannot under any circumstances extend our service to this extent.

Town automobile license tags to be on sale at Town Hall on January 2. The Town ordinance requires that all automobiles resident in the Town of Brevard for more than two weeks shall display such a license tag. These tags will be on sale for \$1.00 each, and those of you who live in the town and desire to have one are perfectly free to buy one. Also Special tags are being provided this year for firemen as last year, and new this year will be special tags for all taxicabs. All license plates except firemen's plates are the same color as this year's state tags. The firemen's tags are in the traditional red and white colors.
