### Breakdown Of Local Dollar Made In Survey

Retail business as a whole was at a high level in Transvlvania county in the past fiscal year as local residents, loaded with cash, went on a buying

They gave major support to the local economy through their purchases of automobiles and of household appliances - clothes dryers, air conditioners, dish washers, freezers and the like.

More money was put into circulation, stimulating activity in other retail lines as well.

The added money had been available to local consumers, ready to be spent, for a long time. They had been holding back, however, waiting for economic conditions to be to their liking. Last year they gained that feeling of confidence and

Just how they divided their retail dollar, as between food, cars, clothing, furniture and other items, is revealed in the latest market data survey, compiled by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It contains comparable figures for every section of the country.

Food, cars and automotive equipment attracted a large part of the dollar in Transylvania county. Approximately 52 percent of it went for such pur-
