Brevard Fire Department Now Equipped With New Modern Tanker-Truck

The Brevard fire department, which is recognized as one of the finest volunteer departments in the state, now has a new 2,000 gallon tankerfire truck ready for use.

While this truck is ideal for fighting rural fires, it is also adapted for urban use as water is available immediately upon the truck's arrival at a blaze.

In the meantime, lines can be laid from the other trucks.

The new and modern tanker-truck can pump more than 200 gallons of water per minute from ponds or streams.

It is also equipped with a canvas reservoir which can store some 1,800 gallons of water.

The new Engine No. 4 was purchased with donations from hundreds of citizens in Brevard and Transylvania county.


F. L. "Buck" McCall is chairman of the finance committee,' and he expresses sincere appreciation to all persons, clubs, industries and others who have given to the campaign.

Actually, a total of \$7,892.60 has been paid on the truck, leaving a balance due of some

Members of the local fire department have given more than 600 man-hours in assemblying the tanker on the bed, painting the truck, etc.

The six - months' drive for the truck began last October, and Mr. McCall feels that the work has been done in record time. Simultaneously, the department has continued its weekly training sessions, and schools for firemen from throughout Western North Carolina have been held here at the fire training center (Cape Canaveral) on the Camp Illahee road.
