Brevard College Trustees To Hold Important Meet Friday

The Brevard College Board of Trustees will hold its annual Spring meeting on Friday in the College Center Building Allen H. Sims, of Gastoria, is Chairman of the Board and will preside.

According to President Emmett K. McLarty, Jr., the Board will review the evidence of steady progress that the college has made over the past five years in developing the physical plant, improving the academic program and strengthening the faculty.
