

The new budget is based on a property valuation of \$33,250. 600.00, as compared with \$30,-500.000.00 for last year.

The tax rate will remain at \$1.75 per \$100 valuation.

The budget estimate for the past year was \$930,269.00. The largest expenditure in the new budget is for school current ex-**Denses**
