

American Thread Company's New Plant At Calvert Is Now "Going Up".





CONSTRUCTION WORK at the American Thread company's plant in the Calvert section of Transylvania is progressing. Recent rains have slowed work to some degree, but the plant is expected to be completed this fall. One of the huge steel girders making up

the frame work of the plant can be seen being swung into position by the big crane in the photo above, left. At right, the railroad spur that was recently added to the plant site can be seen leading from the main line. The crane and steel work is again visible, this time in

Appeal Made For Help To Rebuild Pool

A special committee of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce has hit what appears to be a dead end in its efforts to raise enough money to rebuild the swimming pool at the Mary C. Jenkins Community center.

Due to a cave in in early spring, a complete rebuilding job is necessary.

Negro leaders appealed to the Town of Brevard for help in this rebuilding project.

Town officials, however, were unable to offer immediate help because of the lack of funds. An appeal was then made to the Brevard Chamber of Commerce.
