

Project "Head Start", a program designed to give children a "head start" in their school experiences, will get underway in Transylvania county this summer.

News that \$21,588 has been alloted for the local program was received Wednesday morning by Superintendent Wayne Bradburn in a telegram from Sargent Shriver. Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Funds for the program were approved under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

The local program will be under the direction of Mrs. C. K. Olson, county supervisor of

12 kindergartens will be set up at the county elementary schools to accommodate 240 children. Classes will be held each morning from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, for an eight weeks period beginning June


