



A RAVENOUS FIRE of undetermined origin completely destroyey the home and possessions of Bud Wiley on Probart street early Monday morning. Mrs. Wiley had taken the children to school shortly before the fire started, and no one was in the dwelling at the time. A pet chihuahua dog, however, was not so lucky, and perished in the fire. The blaze apparently started in the kitchen,

but it had such a head start before the Brevard fire department was notified that this could not be verified for certain. The local firemen could save nothing from the flames even though they battled valiantly to bring the fire under control. Two different views of the destructive blaze are pictured here. Above left, firemen gamely,

but hopelessly turn a hose on the back of the house where flames had already completely destroyed that part of the structure. Above right, the flames are shown getting closer to the side of the dwelling that was the last to go. Shortly after the pictures were made, nothing was left standing but the concrete foundation.
