Transylvania leaders have accepted an aiternate proposal calling for construction of TVA dams on the West Fork, North Fork and East Fork of the French Broad River in Transylvania county.

The alternate proposal, voted on and accepted at a meeting here in Brevard Wednesday of Transylvania leaders, including the county commissioners, representatives of Brevard, Rosman and the Little River community and TVA officials, plus representatives of other counties directly involved in the Upper French Broad flood centrol project, calls for the following action:
