Allocation of the first phase of the Road Bond money in Transylvania county is announced today.

Approximately one fifth of the total allocation, or \$107,-000, will be spent on the projects in this first phase.

The following roads will be graded, stoned and paved:

Walter McGuire road, which is off Highway 280 for a distance of .60 miles.

The Ross road loop off the Rosman highway, 1.10 miles.
