

Collections of sales and use taxes in Transylvania were approximately 14 per cent higher in 1965 than they were in 1964, a report from Raleigh reveals today.

Actually, the period of col-lection was from February 1st through January of the following year.

They were as follows: 1965 - \$489,580

1964 - \$429,665. The gain was \$59,915.

Across the state, the net gain was 10.05 per cent.

Local Facility Has Command Over Telescopes

Rosman has made astronomical history;

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration station at Rosman, in the Pisgah National Forest, is NASA's key Data Acquisition Facility to command and to receive information from an instrument in space said to provide the greatest advance in astronomy since the invention of the telescope.

This is NASA's Orbiting Astronomical Observatory (OAO) scheduled to be launched from Cape Kennedy about the same time that The Transylvania Times went to press Wednesday

Original launching was slated for this past Monday, however it was postponed until Wednes-

OAO is an advanced type of telescope traveling through space. It is designed to give astronomers their first sustained study of the stars from be-yond the obscuring, distorting effects of the earth's atmo-

The Rosman station, on order from the OAO Control at God-Space Flight Center, Greenbelt, Md., has responsibilty to command OAO to point its telescopes at certain stars selected by the researchers.

Rosman will then command the Observatory to transmit back information about the
