**Light Vote Is Expected**, Polls Open 6:30-6:30

A light vote is expected this Saturday in Transylvania in the run-off election for the Democratic nomination for the office of Sheriff.

In the race are Gill Thomas, the high man in the Primary on May 28th, and T. Wood Paxton, who was second high in the five-candidate contest.

Mr. Paxton said he called the run-off at the insistence of many supporters.

Due to the fact that there were several candidates in the race and the closeness of the vote, Mr. Paxton says his friends are convinced that the Primary vote did not give a true picture of the wishes of the Democratic voters.

In the Primary, Mr. Thomas received 1,250 votes, while Mr. Paxton was given 1,146 by the Democrats.

Others in the race and the vote they received are as follows:



Transylvania Deputy Sheriff Ed Owens, who fired the fatal shot, was completely exonerated at a coroner's inquest held last Saturday morning, when the coroner's jury ruled that Owens fired in self defense in shooting Earl Albert Napier, 31, of Stoney Fork, Ky.

The shooting occurred on Buscell Mountain just outside of prevard when Deputy Sheriff Owens and Brevard Policeman Robert C. Rogers answered a call that there was "some showing going on" in the Burrell Mountain area, about 6:30 a.m. last Thursday morning.

The two officers encountered Napier and a young woman. later identified as his wife, in an automobile parked on the side of the road. Owens placed Napier under arrest, handcuffed and searched him, and asked him where the gun was that had been doing all

recently of Las Vegas, Nevada, got out of the car, came around to the back and passed between Napier and Officer Rogers, apparently handing Napier the gun. Napier immediately opened

fire, hitting Rogers three times and barely missing Owens. As Rogers grappled with Napier. Owens took the only clear shot he had, firing once and hitting Napier in the lower chest.

After kicking the gun far from Napier's grasp, Owens then called an ambulance for the two wounded men. When he returned. Napier had struggled off some hundred yards down in the deep underbrush, fatally wounded. He died a few minutes later.


