## 50 Years Ago Old Toxaway Dam Broke, File Scanned

This weeks marks the 50th anniversary of the breaking of the old Toxaway dam and the disastrous flood in Western North Carolina in 1916.

Two photographs showing damages to railroad tracks are carried in the fourth section of this week's Times. They were furnished this newspaper by David Ward who witnessed flooding damages from Black Mountain to Brevard.

The original dam was 600 feet long and 62 feet high. It had impounded Lake Toxaway for 14 years, and the water covered some 550 acres.
