Watkins Is New Director Of Works Program At Schenck

William P. Thomas, director at Schenck Job Corps Conservation Center, announces today the arrival of John T. Watkins, who will assume the duties of deputy director of work programs at the Schenck Job Corps Center. Mr. Watkins replaces S. J. Verucchi, who has been transferred to the Ozark - St. Francis National Forest in Arkansas.

Mr. Watkins comes to the Center from the Ozark - St. Francis National Forest where he was assistant district ranger on the Mt. Magazine Ranger

District. Prior to this assignment Watkins has spent his Forest service career in National Forest administration in Arkansas. While at Schenck he will be in charge of all Job Corps construction projects both at the center as well as on the Pisgah Ranger district.

Mr. Watkins is a graduate of Louisiana State University. He received a B. S. degree in forestry during 1957. He is a native of Hammond, La.

Watkins is married and has two children.

Michael J. Dunn, III's topic "Choose Your Waterfall" depicts the playground of silver waterfalls, blue lakes, gray mountains, and green forests nestled in the southwestern tip of North Carolina.

Pictured are the familiar Looking Glass Falls in the Pisgah National Forest, Whitewater Falls which straddles the state line between North and South Carolina, and Sliding Rock, the giant water slide for swimmers also located in Pisgah.

Also illustrated in a map outline are the ideal campgrounds in the southwestern area of North Carolina. Mentioned here are Coonrock located on the Davidson river; the historic location Pink Bess; White Pines, characterized by a shady and quiet area with a stream and nearby hiking trails and the Little River Camping Resort featuring all water sports.

In his article, Mr. Dunn describes these areas in greater detail giving specific location and accommodations for the reader.
