Trustees will begin Thursday afternoon for the fall meeting of the Board of Trustees of Brevard College.


The trustees will be guests of honor at a dinner Thursday evening at 6:30 in the college's cafeteria. The dinner will be given by the administration and faculty of the college.

The figures indicate that ap-oximately 85.1 percent of e households in Transylvania County now own one or more automobiles, as against 76.7 percent in 1960.

Elsewhere in the United States, by comparison, 78.4 percent are car owners and, in the South Atlantic States, 77.5 percent. The accountion of homes in the regional area equipped with clothes drivers has also gone up. Ownership has increased by about 105 percent since 1960, it is estimated.

Similarly, television sets in Transylvania County are more numerous, according to the figures. Some 84.0 percent of the households in the area have one or more sets at the present time. In 1960 it was 75.4 percent.

As to washing machines, despite the fact that there are more in use than ever before, there has been little change

there has been little change in the proportion of families reporting ownership since 1980.

The Commerce Department explains that this is due to an increase in the number of families living in rented dwelling units. Washing machines are frequently provided in rental housing.

Currently, an estimated 85.1 percent of local households are isted as owners of washing machines.

The report also relates own-ership of household appli-ances to income and shows that as income per family rises, as has been the case in the local area during the seven-year period, ownership also rises.

County Boards Of Elect Meet, Information Reveal

This is assuming that a new county wide reregistration is ordered by the county board of elections.

Saturday, May 4, 1968, will be the day on which the first primary will be held.

Then there were details regarding the loose - leaf registration system which will pertain to our county. This type system must be installed by 1970 and our county commissioners have already provided funds to install this system for the 1968 elections. The county board of elections announced their desire to adopt a loose - leaf registration system last fall. So, it appears very likely that our voters will be using this system next year. This is the same system which the Town of Brevard has been using for several elections. for several elections.

This loose - leaf registra-tion system will provide a separate sheet or "loose-leaf" for each registrant so that these can be arranged alpha-betically in a locked binder for each precinct. Two copies will be made of each sheet so that the election board of-fice can keep at all times an alphabetical list of regis-trants for the entire county trants for the entire county as well as for each precinct.
