Rising Business Tempo In Transylvania

Transylvania County's economy continued moving forward during the past year, according to a report on the nation's markets, just re-

Significant gains were chalk-ed up in the local trading area as consumers, with more money at their command, indutged in rge - scale spending.

The amount that they spent in the area, and what it meant for local retail merchants, are brought out in Sales Management's new "Survey of Buy-ing Power."

The copyrighted report pre-sents data on income and spend-ing for every section of the

the previous year's \$38,600.00.

Just how much this represented, on a pre - family basis, was determined by dividing the total income by the number of local households. It amounted, on average, to \$8,548, an increase over the prior year's \$7,-

The rise, 8.5 percent, was greater than elsewhere in the United States, 6.4 percent and the State of North Carolina's 6.2 percent.

What did local residents do with their bigger incomes? The figures show that they spent more for furniture, bought more for furniture, bought more air conditioners, refrigera-tors and washing machines, pur-chased fancier foods and, in general, treated themselves hore luxuriously.

Neither the surtax nor the igher cost of goods and ser-ices deterred them to a no-

As a result, retail business in the area was good. Local merchants accounted for gross sales of \$18,391,000, bettering the previous year's \$17,974,000

Each community is rated in the survey on the basis of the amount of retail business actually done, as compared with its estimated full capacity.

It does this through an "index of buying power," which takes into account income, population and sales.

Transvivania County's in-dex rating is .0073, indicat-ing that it is capable of producing that percent of the nation's retail business.

Since it accounted for less an that last year, .0055 per-ent, the conclusion is that one of the local purchasing opential is yet to be achiev-
