
The regular meeting of the Transylvania Wildlife club will be held in the downstairs conference room of First Citizens bank building on Monday, Sept.

Citizens Will Decide Issue **November 4th**

The Transvlvania County Elections Board Chairman Ligon B. Ard has given notice that a special election will be conducted in the county November 4th on the question of whether a local one per cent sales and use tax will be levied.

Notice is further given that if a majority of the qualified voters, voting at said election, vote FOR the levy of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax, then said tax shall be levied beginning the first day of the month following the expiration of ninety (90) days from the date of said election and collected by the **Commissioner** of Revenue as provided by law.


The election will be conducted at all 18 polling places in Transylvania county.

These are carried in a special legal notice this week on page four, second section.

A new registration of voters is not required. The registration books of Transylvania County in the election precincts named will be used. Each registrar will keep open the registration books for his precinct at the polling places, for the registration of votors not previously registered, from 9:00 o'clock A.M. until 6:30 P.M. on each Saturday, October 11th, 18th, and 25th. Saturday, November 1, 1969 is challenge day.

Absentee ballots will not be used in this election, Mr. Ard states.

At Tuesday's Meeting **Commerce Directors Support** A Favorable Vote In Election

Directors of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce have gone on record in support of

the one cent local sales tax increase that Tar Heel voters will go to the polls to vote on this November 4th.

This action was taken at Tuesday night's regular monthly Many friends of Camp Illahee meeting of the chamber in the

> library. **County Commissioner "Guis"** Siniard and Brevard Mayor R. F. Bennett, both directors of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce, explained to the other directors and members in attendance just what the one cent sales tax increase,

which will all stay right here in Transylvania, would mean to both the city and county. It was pointed out that, based

on last year's sales figures for Transylvania, the one cent increase would bring approximately \$205,000 in increased revenue into Transylvania.

Termed Tax Evasion Scheme

Of this amount, a certain percentage would go to the municipalities of Brevard and Rosman, while the remainder would go to the county.

It was pointed out that this opportunity to bring additional tax money into this county by means of a sales tax increase would probably be the only such opportunity that will arise.

Should the local voters reject the one cent increase at the polls, the next General Assembly, in all likelihood, will pass such an increase anyway, and the individual counties of the state would not benefit like they will if the increase is adopted at the polls in November.

After much discussion on the subject, the directors voted unanimously to adopt a resolution favoring passage of the proposed sales tax increase.

In other business, the directors authorized the finance committee to make funds available, if necessary, to the merchants division to assist in their Christmas lighting program this year.

A report from the highway committee was heard, and the directors were shocked to learn that there is apparently no record at the Highway De-partment in Raleigh on any proposed plan of construction of the Williamson's Creek Road from Brevard to the Du -Turn to Page Sever

"A tax evasion scheme that in 15 years will cost the taxpayers over three hundred million dollars."

That was the charge leveled by Duke Power Vice President J. P. Lucas, Jr. at the massive statewide generating and transmission system being proposed by the state's municipal and coop electric systems.

The state's cities which are in power business and the electric cooperatives recently announced a plan whereby the cities would build large generating plants and the coops would build over 7,000 miles of transmission lines. Backers of the plan said that the work would begin in 1975 and be completed in 1990 at an estimated cost of \$1.75 billion.

Mr. Lucas noted that the \$1.75 billion was in terms of present costs and the actual cost would be many millions more by 1990. Engineers who submitted -Turn to Page Five
