Brevard Housing Authority Elects A Director And Architects

Brevard attorney and chair-man of the Brevard Housing Authority, has announced the election of Charles S. Dun-lop as Executive Director, and the firm of McDonald, Brewton, and Associates as architects for the Authority.

At the same time, Mr. Hill announced that the Housing and Urban Development office in Atlanta, Georgia, has committed 100 public housing units to the local authority to be constructed in the Brevard area. Forty of these units will be

designated for retired people.

According to Mr. Hill, the project will be established in approximately 4 locations. The buildings will be modern apartment structures with apartments from the small efficiencies" to some with 5 bedrooms.

The rent to be paid will be based upon the income of the tennants, but will not exceed 20% of his total income. The Federal Government, at a later date, will establish the maximum income in this area with which persons may be eligible to rent the apartments.

The locations will be chosen this January by representatives of the Housing and Urban Development Authority. The architects have begun preliminary design and construction is expected to start during the summer of next year. The anticipated ent of the whole project is \$1.5 millions.

Survey Reveals

With each passing year, more and more of them are finding that they can take care of their household responsibilities and still have enough spare time to permit them to take outside jobs.

In Transylvania County, an

estimated 35.2 per cent of the married women are now employed, according to the latest statistics. This compares with 26.7 per cent in 1960.

On the average, throughout the United States, in more than 1 out of every 3 hus-band-wife families, the wife is employed, either part-time or full-time.

It represents a considerable change over earlier years. In 1952, for example, only 1 out of 5 wives was in the labor
