Latest Figures Give Transylvania **Population Gain Of 13.4 Percent**

Here's The Story: 1960 - 16,372 1970 - 18,571

More recent figures on the results of the 1970 Census show that Transylvania county had a gain of 13.4 percent during the past 10 years.

Earlier this fall, it was reported that the county's gain was slightly over 11%. Final figures will not be released until January, 1971.

The latest count shows that Transylvania had 18,571 at the end of the 1970 census, as compared with 16.372 in 1960.

The 11th Congressional Distrist - 16 Western North Carolina counties, including Transylvania — totals show an increase of only 2.2 percent.

Joel New, Director of the United States Department of **Commerce Library at Greens**boro, told The Times this week that corrections have been fed into the Census Bureau's computers but have not been processed.
