The criminal term of the March-April session of Snperior Court was moving through a heavy docket here in Transvlvania, and several verdicts had been handed down as the Times went to press at noon Wednesday.

Presiding Judge Fred H. Hasty, of Charlotte, had to empanel 12 additional jurors to serve during the busy term, as the 24 who had been originally summoned turned out to be an insufficient number.

Included in the verdicts already handed down were these:

R. A. Ballance, charged with three cases of embezzlement from Carolina Tire Company, was sentenced to serve from three to five years in the State department of corrections after pleading rolo contendre. He was placed on probation for five years, ordered to repay the \$2,397 embezzled and court costs.

Billy Cornwell, charged with escape from the State department of corrections, pled guilty and was sentenced to serve 60 days here in Transylvania county jail.

Phil Pressley, charged with writing worthless checks, pled nole contendre, and was sentenced to serve 12 months, suspended for three years. and was ordered to repay \$750 to make worthless checks good, and had to pay
