Mayor, Aldermen Seeking Re-Election

Mayor Raymond F. Bennett and Aldermen W. David Sams, W. M. Melton and Charles L. Russell have filed as candidates to succeed themselves in the coming Municipal election on May 4. The Mayor's term is for two years and the Aldermen's term is for four years.

Alderman Sams is now completing six years of service. Alderman Melton is completing two years of recent service and he previously served ten years between 1943 and 1953. Alderman Russell is completing

an unexpired term and previously served four years and a few months between 1947 and 1951.

Mayor Bennett is completing six years and four months of service. For the past 18 months, he has also been serving as City Manager without pay. This has allowed \$18,000.00 of salary and expense money to be spent on street paving and similar City improvements.

These candidates say that their reasons for wanting to

serve another term were that they had several more City improvements that they want to make, while keeping the City's finances on a sound basis without further tax increases.

They said that the general public had given them wonderful support in the past and that this had made their work pleasant and satisfying. A continuation of this should make further progress easy.

35th Anniversary Season Of Brevard Music Festival Will Be Finest Ever

Programs Begin
July 2nd, End
On August 15th

The 35th anniversary season of the world-famed Brevard Music Festival has been announced by festival officials in Brevard. Once again a broad cross-section of styles and types of music are planned for 1971.

The seven-week festival season, comprising 21 different performances of symphony concerts, operas and shows and Pops concerts, will run each Friday through Sunday from July 2nd through August 15th.

The Brevard Music Center Orchestra, conducted by Music Center Director Henry Janiec, will again be the mainstay of most Festival performances. A combination of faculty members and advanced students, the orchestra numbers over 90 players.

Heading the line-up of guest artists for 1971 are Met singers Marilyn Horne and Jerome Hines. Miss Horne has recently been hailed as one of the most exciting singers in the world and has teamed with soprano Joan Sutherland in performances in most of the international opera houses. She has been featured recently in LIFE magazine, the New York Times, and prime time television shows. Jerome Hines, a longtime member of the Met, is still recognized as one of the premiere basses of the world.

A special highlight of the Brevard season will be a joint appearance with orchestra by Greek pianist Gina Bachauer and her famous pupil, Princess Irene of Greece. Presently in exile with the royal family of Greece, the Princess is a skilled musician and has appeared in Europe and America as a concert artist.

Commissioners Informed

Board Of Education Adopts Resolution, Cites Conditions

The Transylvania County Board of Education has issued a statement regarding the school facilities improvement, and on Monday the members of the Board presented this statement and a Resolution to the Board of County Commissioners.

The Resolution requests the Board to provide additional school facilities in Transylvania county.

Action by the Board was deferred, pending further study and investigation.

The Statement and the Resolution are as follows:

STATEMENT

The Transylvania County Board of Education reaffirms its support of the recommendations of recent studies relating to the improvement of our schools. Long range goals call for the provision of comprehensively relevant programs and adequate facilities for grades K-12. As pointed out in the studies, the quickest way to provide the facilities for this program that is so urgently needed for the youth of our county is with the construction of the following facilities:

- (1) A county-wide high school to house all students in grades 9-12

RESOLUTION

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Transylvania County Board of Education:

Section 1. That the Transylvania County Board of Education has determined and found as a fact that adequate school facilities are not now available in the County of Transylvania to comply with the requirements of Section 3 of Article IX of the Constitution of North Carolina for the maintenance of schools six months in every year, and that it is necessary, in order to maintain such six months school term as required by said Section 3 of Article IX of

Discrepancies Found

Grand Jury Inspects Schools And County Public Buildings

The Grand Jury Report for the March 29, 1971 Superior Court, following inspections on March 29 and 30, 1971, contains a long list of discrepancies in the various public buildings throughout the county—especially the Rosman school buildings—but ends by commending the Rosman principals for the excellent job they are doing under the circumstances.

Addressed to The Honorable Fred H. Hasty, Judge Presid-

ing, the report begins by thanking the Presiding Judge, Solicitor, Sheriff and his Deputies, the Clerk of Superior Court, and all officers and officials for their assistance to the jury in the performance of its duty. It follows with more than 10 pages of discrepancies in the public buildings and schools in the county.

The report is signed by Clarence E. Goodson, Foreman of the Grand Jury.

Court House

Beginning with the Court

House, the report cites 49 discrepancies inside the building, in the various county offices and the courtroom, and outside the building. The findings are mostly minor, yet many of them have been noted before in earlier Grand Jury reports. Some are of a larger nature, from masonry repair needed to roofing and guttering repair. A large amount of general cleanup, painting and cleaning was recommended for parts of the Court House with a strong

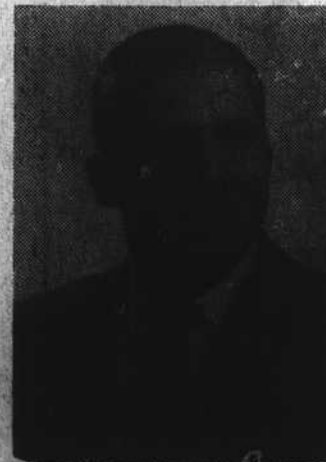
This has been a period of great progress for Brevard, which would not have been possible without the close teamwork of the Board to which Mr. Johnson made a substantial contribution.
