## Board Of Education Adopts Resolution, Cites Conditions

of Transvlvania County.

(2) New elementary facilities to replace the old high school and elementary buildings at Rosman. Grades K-8 would be housed in these facilities; and the present gymnasium, the shop building, and the 1949 elementary building on the Rosman site.

(3) A new elementary school on the present Brevard High School site to house grades K-5. The present Brevard High School would be used for a middle school to house grades 6-8 as the present Brevard Junior High School facility is entirely unsatisfactory. Penrose, Pisgah Forest, Straus and T. C. Henderson Elementary Schools would house grades K-5 when the proposed program is completely implemented.

The proposed three new facilities can be provided with funds from the sale of bonds, if approved by the voters of Transylvania County, and Appalachian Regional Development Funds. The Board of Education requests the Transylvania County Board of Commissioners to consider levying the local option one (1) cent sales tax in order that the personal and real property tax burden would be minimized with the passage of a school bond issue.

If the proposed bond issue is not approved by the voters, we respectfully request that the Board of Commissioners take such steps as may be necessary to provide a minimum of \$2,500,000.00 to cover the cost of the absolutely necessary renovation, replacement, and modernizing needed to bring our schools up to required minimum standards.

Dr. J. L. Pierce, Director of the Division of School Planning of the North Carolina Department of public Instruction, and members of his staff clearly stated in a report to the Board of Education that new construction is more practical and desirable than renovation of old facilities. With the alternate "payas- you-go" plan proposed by some a new Brevard Elementary and middle schools could be constructed on a new site(s) without disruption of the existing program at either school. However, replacement of the older facilities at Rosman under this alternate plan would necessitate multiple use of the gymnasium, shop building, and the 1949 Rosman Elementary Building while the old

buildings are being renovated or replaced with new facilities and would impose serious, if not insurmountable, difficulties.

Recognizing the fact that a "payas-you go" plan would necessitate a substantial property tax increase in addition to revenues accrued from a local one (1) cent sales tax and thus imposing a heavier burden on the taxpayers of Transylvania county for a period of twelve to fifteen years, and that this plan does not provide for a kindergarten program at any of the elementary schools in the county, the Board of Education strongly recommends that the Commissioners request the voters of Transylvania County to approve a school bond issue. However, the Board of Education is aware of its legal responsibilities to provide adequate facilities and instructional programs for the youth of Transylvana County, and also realizes the urgency of improving the conditions of our facilities in the immediate future and thus formally requests the Transylvania County Commissioners to provide funds for upgrading the school facilities should a school bond issue be unsuccessful.

the Constitution, to erect additional school buildings and other school plant facilities, remodel, enlarge and reconstruct school buildings and other school plant facilities, and acquire necessary land and equipment therefor, in order to provide additional school facilities in said County, the estimated cost of which is \$5,220,000.

Section 2. That the Board of Commissioners for the County of Transylvania is requested to take all necessary steps, by the issuance of bonds or otherwise, in order that funds may be provided for such school facilities.

Section 3. That we do respectfully recommend that the Board of Commissioners consider the levy of a one (1) cent sales tax to help defray the cost of the proposed additional school facilities and help to relieve as much as possible the property tax levy on our taxpayers.

Section 4. That a copy of this resolution shall immediately be certified to the Board of Commissioners for said County.
