Invitation Issued For Bids For Construction Of Hospital

A call for bids on construction of the new Transylvania Community hospital has been issued.

These invitations for bids are in two parts: One for the General contract and the other for the construction of certain water and sewer lines and sewerage pump station.

Bids will be received on the General contract on Tuesday, June 1, 1971 at 2:00 p.m. DST, and will be opened immediately thereafter.

Sealed bids will be received on the other project until 3:00 p.m. on May 20th.

Work is progressing nicely

on the road into the hospital site off the four-lane highway between Brevard and Pisgah Forest. While much work has been done on grading the site, there's still a lot to do, reports say.

Construction on the new hospital could begin within 30 days after the opening of the bids.

Jack C. Dense, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the local hospital, says he is elated with the present progress that is being made toward building the new hospital.

Lions Conduct Broom Sale This Weekend

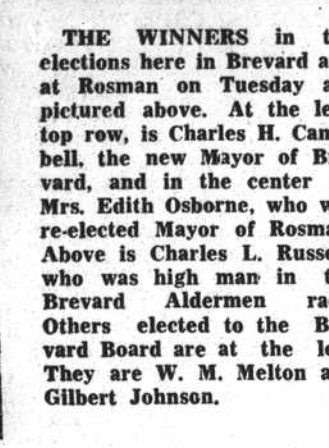
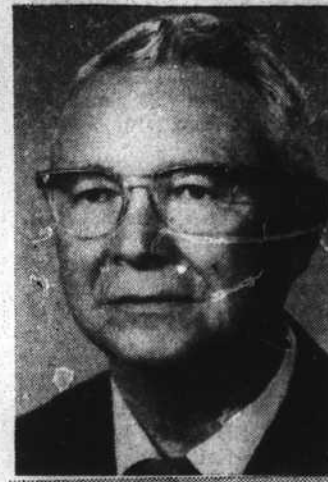
Brevard Lions will be conducting their annual Broom sale this Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Campbell Is Elected, Also Two Incumbent Board Members

Mayor Raymond F. Bennett was upset in his bid for a fourth term in the Municipal Election here in Brevard on Tuesday.

Charles H. Campbell was the winner in the Mayor's race with a vote of 523 to 471 for Mr. Bennett.

Less than half of the registered voters in the town voted in the election.

In the race for three seats on the Board of Aldermen, Charles L. Russell was the high man with 558 votes.

Another incumbent Board member, W. M. Melton, ran second high with 471 votes. The third man elected to the Board was Gilbert Johnson with 433 votes.

Others in the Aldermen race and the votes they received were as follows:

- Gaston Siniard—409
- W. David Sams—385
- Grady Elliott—353
- John Durrett—148.

The new Mayor and the Board members were sworn into office Wednesday morning following the canvass of the ballots.

On the heels of the freezing weather is the threat again of forest fires. It has been caused by the wind, the frost and the lack of rainfall, according to the NC Forest Service.

The forecast for Wednesday night and Thursday calls for mostly cloudy skies with a chance of showers and thunderstorms, with a high Thursday around 70.
