Realtec Will Offer 2,500 Home Sites

The purchase of 3,900 acres of land surrounding the famous Connestee Falls south of Brevard by Realtec, Inc., of Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, is announced this week.

Plans for the development of a new year-round recreational community of more than 2,500 home sites at the Connestee project is planned, Stanley Whitcomb, Executive Vice President of Realtec, stated in the announcement.

Realtec is a subsidiary of Certain-teed Products Corporation, Valley Forge, Pa., one of the world's largest leading producers of building materials. Certain-teed stock is listed on the New York Stock Exchange. Realtec handles land acquisitions and development Group.

Last week Realtec announced the acquisition of an additional 5,000 acres, including Sapphire Valley Inn and Country Club and golf course in Sapphire, a 45-minute drive from the Connestee Project.

"These projects are the first steps in a series of wellplanned and researched investments and transactions which Realtec will carry out in behalf of the Urban Development Group of Certainteed Corporation," Mr. Whitcomb said. "All our efforts are within the scope of Certain-teed's long range program which will provide planned communities for America's growing population while preserving our nation's ecology".
