Dear Mr. S.: In one news-paper, the following statement appeared in a discussion of a particular dis-ease:

"Symp-toms such as itching, fever, headache, general aches and pain, and di-arrhea can begin about a month later,

and last several weeks." It goes on to say that months or years thereafter patients with these symptoms can die from serious damage to the liver, the spleen, the bowel and other organs, including the spinal

Now, if you were a sensitive, somewhat fearful person won't you agree that reading these symptoms might induce in you a sense of terror if you had one or more of these com-

Yet every doctor knows that any of these symptoms, alone or in combination with each other, might well suggest 30 or 40 different conditions.

Even physicians, with their highly trained diagnostic knowledge, would have to study the problem intensively to arrive at the true diagnosis.

How then could a reader, especially a nervous one, be benefited by any run-down of symptoms? The symptoms described

above actually refer to a rare disease known as "snail fever," or schistosomiasis.
