Famous Racing Movie, "Jump", Now Playing Here In Brevard

Following the World Premiere in Asheville last. Thursday, "Jump", the Intest film on stock car racing, is now playing at the Co-Ed theatre here in Brevard through next Tuesday.

Governor Bob Scott attended the World Premiere in Asheville along with hundreds and hundreds of Western North Carolina movie goers, and generally, they appeared to have liked the show tremendously.

Today, stock car racing, certainly one of the few major sports indigenous to America, attracts an estimated 75% of the 50 million fans who follow motor racing

Its history is a saga of rural Southern America, hav-ing roots traceable to the late 1920's when Southern country boys ran whiskey be-tween rural towns, and a Model T camouflaging a souped-up engine was one sure way of getting away from the "revenooers".

The "bootlegger's turn" in today's stock car racing argot, a 180 degree about face at full speed as executed by the star of "Jump", Tom Ligon, in the film's major racing sequence, is a nostalgic reminder of an era when some times the only way to elude pursuit was to change direction, instantly, at 60 mph.

Rising Star

Ligon became nationally familiar in the recently released Paramount production of "Paint Your Wagon," and made his New York theatrical debut as the suave Orson in the original company of the prize-winning musical "Your Own Thing." Tom is very much into today's youth scene, travels with his own supply of organic food which he prepares himself on location, speaks Russian and French, and lives in Greenwich

In "JUMP", he is playing a role at the opposite end of the cultural spectrum, a rural Appalachian youth named Chester Jump whose love of fast cars and search for recognition leads him from daredevil racing to personal confrontation reality in a demolition derby, and he loves the role. sees Jump as a strong, gut character, an archtype of a natural folk hero, unaware of his real strengths; a product of an entire subculture derived from the stock car henomenon, and in interpreting the role, feels he will be working out his, as well as Jump's fantasies about machines, held since youth.

Tom travelled around the world in that youth, as an Army "brat." He finally ended up at Yale where his interest in theatre led him to member-ship in the Yale Dramatic Association and in Skull and Bones, one of the country's nost prestigious college clubs.

Following graduation, he acted in summer stock, his first appearance being with Art Carney in "Time Out for Ginger." Since, audiences across the United States and Canada have seen him in tours of "Cactus Flower," "The Impossible Years," "The Philadelphia Story," and "Generation." Generation."
