Two Transylvania Teachers To Make Study-Tour Of North Africa

Two Transylvania County teachers have been selected by Western Carolina University to participate in a study - tour of North Africa this summer.

They are Mrs. Paula Lyday Crawford of 201 Southview Dr.

Mrs. Metzger teaches at Rosman Junior High School. She received the bachelor of arts degree and the bachelor of science in education degree from WCU.

Mr. Crawford teaches at T. C. Henderson School. He presently is enrolled in the mas ter's degree program at WCU.

The special WCU program, planned for 30 persons, is sup-ported by a U. S. Office of Education grant. It is designed to place selected educators in Morocco and Tunisia for a concentrated five - weeks study of the culture, art, history, and geography of the two Arabic countries.

Following the conclusion of the study tour, individual members of the group will have the opportunity to stop for several days in Europe before return-ing to the United States.

The educator participants will serve as special resource persons in their respectivve school systems during the coming school year to help plan and implement studies on North Africa.



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




en does a baby need. hard sole shoes?
