gether in order to have a more orderly reference for the directors, members, committees, and club staff. They have been revised from time to time and will be revised in the future as circumstances indicate revisions should be made.

Following are the first 8 of 30—Rules of Play:

1. All play is governed by USGA rules except for the following local rules.

a) Preferred Lie — Preferred lie allowed in fairway of hole being played. Ball may be moved with clubhead 6 inches from place where ball comes to rest but no nearer hole.

b) Lifting an Embedded Ball A ball which by force of impact remains imbedded in its own pit-mark in fairway of hole being played may be lifted without penalty, cleaned, and dropped as near as possible to the spot where it lay and must come to rest not nearer the hole.

c) Ball on Cart Paths or Bridges A ball lying on cart

paths or bridges may be lifted and dropped in accordance with the rules without penalty.

d) Ball Near Young Trees at Point Where Tree Interferes With Swing Drop 2 club lengths away from tree no nearer hole without penalty.

2. The Pro Shop Management shall have the responsibility of supervising and enforcing the Rules of Play. Anyone needing clarification of the rules should see the Pro Shop Management.

3. Play will begin from the first tee unless permission obtained from Starter or Pro Shop to start on tenth tee. Any match finishing the 18th hole will automatically take its turn on the first tee if they wish to continue play, regardless of how many previous holes have been played (9, 18, 27, etc.). Everyone playing golf must register in person at the Pro Shop before beginning play. Members are responsible for registering their guests and seeing that green fees and cart fees are paid.

4. FIVESOMES — Fivesomes are allowed if all three of the following conditions are met.

a) From November 1st through March 31st.

b) Play not be held up.

c) Permission of Pro Shop be obtained before play.

5. Replace Divots in the fairway; Repair Ball Marks on the greens; and Smooth Foot Prints in Sand Traps after playing shot.

6. Do not drag spikes on greens, causing scuff marks. Spikes with uneven lengths will also cause scuff marks.

7. Use trash cans for disposal of paper cups, cigarette wrappers, and other trash.

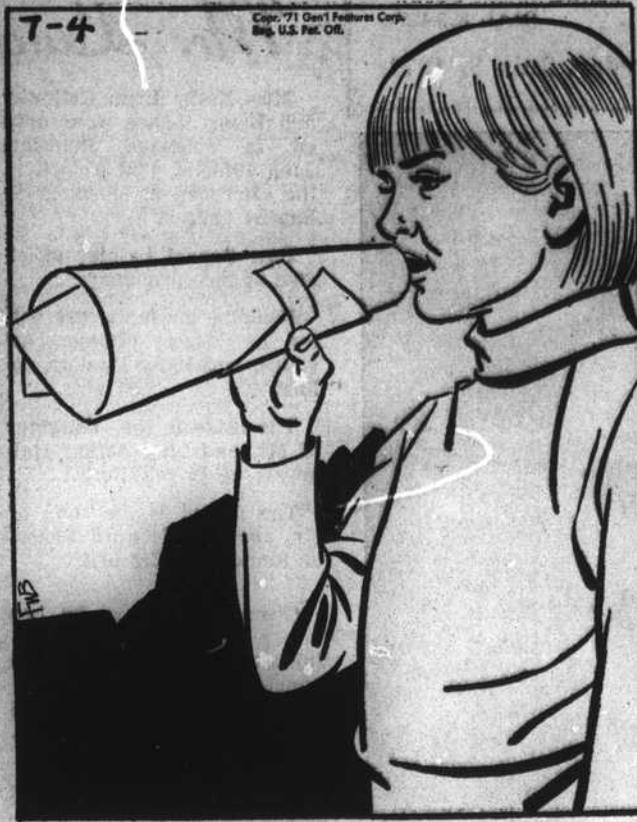
8. No drink bottles or cans allowed on the course.

PROBLEM: A megaphone.

NEEDED: Light cardboard.

DO THIS: Roll the cardboard into megaphone shape. Talk through it to someone several feet away, then talk in the same voice without it. The voice carries farther and is louder when the megaphone is used.

HERE'S WHY: In ordinary speech the sound waves go out in all directions, getting weaker as they go farther. The megaphone concentrates them so that more of them go in one general direction without losing so much of their energy in that direction.

### Worry Now—Enjoy Later

OUR 10-year-old daughter has recovered from rheumatic fever with a slight heart complication.

I know it may sound ridiculous, but we are having long-range fears that our child may never be able to have children when she is married.

Mr. and Mrs. P. C. Wis. Dear Mr. and Mrs. C.:

Ten-year-old girls become 20-year-olds almost overnight. You are perfectly right in considering the problem now. By expressing your fears you will relieve yourself of many years of unnecessary anxiety.

A slight heart complication will undoubtedly be followed by your doctor who, I am certain, has assured you that your fears are exaggerated.

Many women who have even had relatively severe heart complications after rheumatic fever have been able to bear more than one child without any difficulty at all.

Modern methods of delivery and the ease and safety of anesthesia take a great deal of the burden off the heart during the delivery process. I'll bet it's a boy!

What causes the tingling of my feet and muscle cramps, especially when I walk rapidly.

Mr. H. Z., Ida. Dear Mr. Z.: Your combination of annoying symptoms suggests the

possibility of some impairment of circulation, especially if there is any discoloration of the feet.

Tobacco, particularly in those who are sensitive to it, may be responsible for spasms of the blood vessels.

Varicose veins and a variety of other changes in the blood vessels should be ruled out by a thorough examination.

Tingling and cramps are the body's cries for attention. The basic reason may turn out to be very unimportant, but you do deserve the benefit of an examination.

At what age should a child with a cleft palate be treated?

Mrs. A. M. K., Maine Dear Mrs. K.: Highly delicate operations have been devised for early surgery of cleft palate.

The choice for the ideal time depends on the judgment of the surgeon. More and more doctors try to perform this operation long before speech is interfered with.

This surgery in very young infants can, with present day anesthesia, be safely performed.
