# Brevard Junior Police League Is Now Active And Is Growing

## The Theme: Recreation And Guidance, Not Law Enforcement

A new youth organization whose purpose is to help curb the increasing rise of delinquency in the area and establish a better relationship between youth and law enforcement is now active in Brevard and growing rapidly. It is the Brevard Junior Police League, which was begun in March 1971 with 42 boys enrolled and is now being expanded to accept 30 more.

The purpose of the organization is to provide supervised group recreation, guidance, and information on law enforcement activities for boys between the ages of 10 and 18. Its activities will include familiarization with law enforcement officers' duties, but members will not be used for police work in any manner.

**PLANNED IN 1970**

Planning for the League began in July 1970 when Brevard Police Chief, J. C. Rowe, Police officers Jim Leopard, Everette Shipman, and Hubert Brown met with Transylvania County Social Services Director, Mrs. Edith Jenkins and Social Workers Mrs. Louise Stroup and Mrs. Pat Galloway. Planning continued for several months with distribution of applications for membership beginning in February, 1971.

Boys in the area responded enthusiastically, particularly those between the ages of 10 and 15, and the first meeting was held in March, 1971.

**ACTIVITIES VARIED**

Activities of the League have been varied. Officers Leopard and Shipman and Deputy Sheriff Brown have alternated conducting meetings. They have demonstrated the use of police equipment, taught precision drilling and camping procedures. Chief Rowe has conducted a course in first-aid and Officer Johnny Morgan has demonstrated judo.

Recreational activities have included going to the movies and the carnival. A morning was spent at the Transylvania County Law Enforcement Association Camp on the Crab Creek Road in Henderson County, and the League recently returned there for a three-day camping trip June 12-14. Accompanied by Officer Shipman and Deputy Brown, the boys fished, swam, hiked, practiced drilling and enjoyed a variety of activities.

**MORE ACTIVITIES ADDED**

With 30 more members being accepted from the backlog of applications on a first-come basis, previous activities will be continued and new ones added. Instruction and practice in the safety and use of firearms will be taught. A precision drill team will be selected for appearance in parades in the area.

Each boy will ride in a patrol car with an officer while on duty. However, League members will not be taken to any hazardous situation but will be left in a safe location and picked up by another patrol car.

More recreational activities including swimming parties and trips to entertainment centers are planned.

**FUNDS CONTRIBUTED**

All funds for the operation of the League have been provided by local businesses, churches and interested individuals. No fees are collected from the boys so that those from

**Japanese Beetle Summer Quarantine**

The Japanese beetle summer quarantine became effective July 1st in the mountain counties of North Carolina. Anyone planning to ship plants, bulbs, or anything containing soil, must have it inspected before the Post Office will accept the package, if it is going to a non-infested area. Arrangements for having plants, etc., inspected, can be made at the Extension Service Office in Brevard.

**WNC Cattlemens Field Day**

The Western North Carolina Cattlemens Field Day will be held in the Jonathan Creek section of Haywood County, Thursday, July 8th, from 8:30 a. m. - 5:00 p.m. The meeting will be held in the Sandy Grove Methodist Church, located four miles west of Lake Junaluska on I-40.

The purpose of this field day is to bring growers the latest up-to-date information on research and recommendations on how they can improve and expand cattle operations. **Junior Dairy Show**

The Western North Carolina Junior Dairy Show will be held Wednesday, August 4th, at the Western North Carolina Agricultural Center at Fletcher. Any bona-fide 4-H or FFA member is eligible to participate.

Those who plan to enter animals in this show should contact Dennis Winters at the Extension Service Office, or Jimmy Bradley and Clinton Owen, the FFA advisors, for an entry blank.

**Household Pests**

There are several pests that often invade the home, especially in the pantry area. Some of these include the Sawtoothed Grain Beetle, the Red Flour Beetle, the Bean Weevil, the Cigarette Beetle, the Indian Meal Moth, and the Rice Weevil. The best way to control the pests is to seal off their food supply in insect proof containers. Chemical control is also very effective.

The two chemicals that have been approved for use in the home are Malathion and Diazinon. Be sure and follow directions on the label when applying these chemicals.

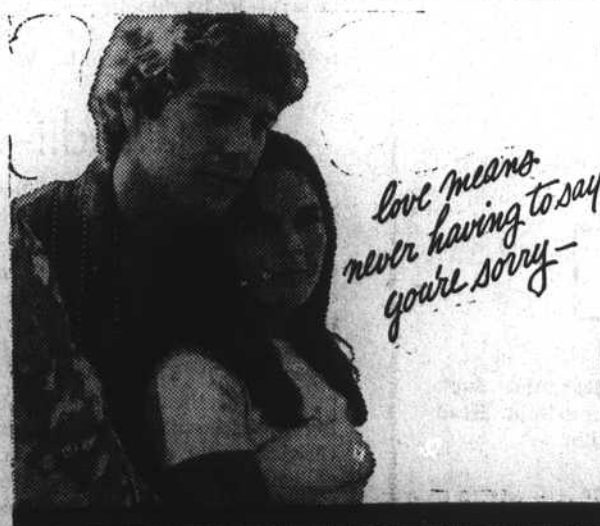

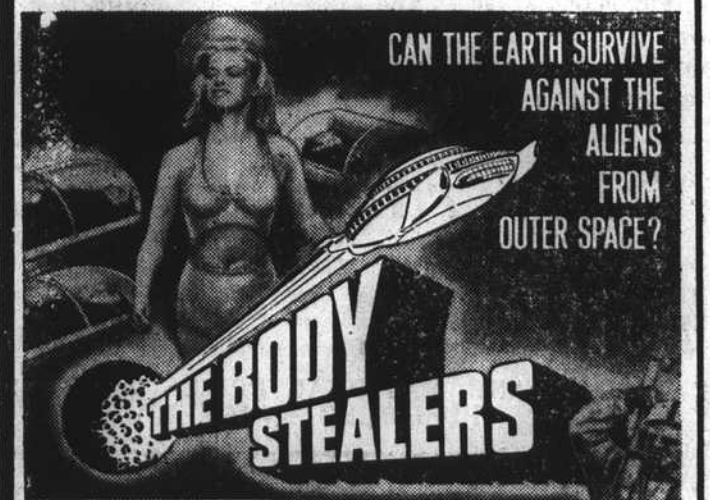
