knowledge and, fighting against time, came up with a drug that saved her life. Oxtriphylline was used after all other drugs had failed. Dr. Robert Jacobs, a specialist in drugs that affect nerves and muscles, explored every chemical lead until he and his associates came up with this drug which seemed to be startingly effective.

The patient was a 17-yearold who was barely able to move her eyes or speak and had lived in a respirator for almost a year. She is alive, able to walk, and has hopes of survival.


