Scrimmage With Brookland Cayce Set For Friday

The Brevard Blue Devils moved into their 10-day football camp last Thursday, and are really beginning to round into form for the upcoming season.

"Our defense is a little ahead of our offense right now," Coach Ed Emory stated in summarizing the team's progress to date. "But we should soon be achieving the balance we must have if we're going to have a successful season."

The squad, 61 strong, should find the answer to some of its question marks this Friday night when it goes up against South Carolina prep power Brookland Cayce of Columbia in a two hour controlled scrimmage session at the local high school stadium.

The scrimmage will be closed to the public with the exception of invited guests, including parents and immediate family of players, members of the Blue Devil Club, Inc. and their families, and season ticket holders.

Rigid control of spectators will be maintained at the gate in order to keep out unwanted scouts from the future opponents of both teams.

"We would like to throw the gates open to the public," Coach Emory explained. "But I'm sure our loyal fans will understand why we can't do that. NCHSAA rules prohibit our charging admission for this practice session, so we must have the right to permit or deny admission as we see fit," he continued.

Coach Emory went on to explain that Brookland Cayce would not have been allowed to participate in the scrimmage session unless controlled admission was enforced.

Friday night's scrimmage will start at 8:30 p.m. and will last for approximately two hours. There will be no kick-offs or punts, and the coaching staffs will be permitted on the playing field during the scrimmage.

This is the first year that NCHSAA rules have permitted such a pre-season scrimmage between two teams that don't face each other during the regular season, and most of the coaches appreciate the new rule.

"We'll keep no scores, of course, for winning or losing is not the purpose of this scrimmage," Coach Emory stated.

"The purpose is to allow both teams to find faults and strengths and to adjust accordingly before the regular season starts," he concluded.

An early evaluation of the team's personnel would indicate an improved defense over last year, and an offense only slightly less effective than that of the 1970 Ivy Conference champs.

Coach Emory had words of praise for his premier quarterback Denny Griffin. "He's throwing and running even better than last year, and he should have a great year," he stated.

The amiable Blue Devil head coach then went on to point out that back-up quarterback Robert Charles, while not blessed with Griffin's experience or physical attributes, was nevertheless the best passer in WNC.

Terry Crite, Jacob Norman and Mitchell Burr have all looked good running the ball, and the Blue Devil ground forces should continue to be devastating.

Emory then commented on passing that his two offensive guards, two year lettermen Marco White and Steve Morgan, are the finest guard tandem in the state, bar none.

White has been out for several days with a cut under his eye, but he is expected to return to his previous great

form very shortly.

Morgan is considered to be the offensive line leader, and he and White combine to make any offense click for Brevard.

Tackles Ben Brown and Tommy Shipman were both signaled out for their great effort in practice sessions to date, as were tight end Darius Holtzclaw, flanker and defensive back Mitch Dockens, and flanker Wayne Robinson.

Emory then praised the ef-

forts of flankers Randy Frisbee, Ricky Salter and Dwight Hooper, which indicates tremendous depth at this position. Robinson is expected to have another fine year as one of Griffin's premier receivers, along with Holtzclaw.

One of the team's big questionmarks is at center, where three fine young ball players are currently battling for the starting berth. Soph Dennis Clark and juniors John Ashworth and James McKinney have been showing fine effort

here, and one of them will probably get the nod.

Others coming in for commendation for their outstanding efforts to date include tackles Jerry Powell and currently injured Van Zeigler, Clarence Moss and David Whitesides, linebackers Burr, Crite, Morgan, Mike Heath, James McKinney, currently injured Ronnie Banther, and Donnie Credille, defensive backs Dockens, Dwight Hooper, Brad Palmer, Stan Hudson, Keith Nicholson,

Rosman Tigers Busy Practicing For 1971 Football Opener With Tryon

With their season opener with powerful Tryon just a little more than a week away, the Rosman Tigers are currently engaged in two-a-day practice sessions in preparation for the invasion of the Polk county forces on Friday, August 27th.

Coach Lee Powell and his

staff are working their 30 member squad hard to have it ready for Tryon's visit, and Coach Elmo Neal had best be ready for a rugged test when he brings his Tigers to Rosman for the season opener for both teams.

"I'm pretty pleased with our progress so far," Coach Powell stated, "And I think

our boys will give a good account of themselves against Tryon."

"Coach Neal's team finished with a fine 8-2 record last year, losing to Hendersonville 7-6 and to Cowpens, S. C. in their opener, and we know they'll field another strong team. But we're going to do our best to be ready for them," Coach Powell said.

The Tiger bossman has a good nucleus to work from. Thirteen lettermen are returning from last year's conference championship team, and many of them have earned monograms for the past two years.

Quick Jimmy Hall will be back to direct Coach Powell's Power "I" offense for the third year. He's had good success in running the team in the past, and this should be his best year yet.

Running in the backfield with Hall will be three other seasoned veterans, lettermen Weldon Whitmore at fullback, Jimmy Carl McCall at halfback, and Tony Gantt at tailback. This quartet should be able to move the ball against most any team on Rosman's schedule.

The forward wall also has a good group of lettermen returning, with big Ralph Johnson the biggest of the lot at 6'3", 215 pounds. He will be running at tight end when he recovers from a wrist injury that has

sidelined him for several days. Veteran Tim Thorpe, 6', 160 pounds will be the split end, switching from right to left as the occasion demands in the power "I".

Two steady lettermen performers return at the tackle slots, Steve Whitmore, 6' 180 pounds, and Alan Cassell, 6' 1", 170 pounds.

Letterman William Cathey, 5' 10", 155 pounds will handle the right guard position, while his brother Sammy Cathey, 5' 10", 140 pounds, is a likely candidate for the other guard slot.

Center is a question mark at this time, but Dean Myers, 5' 11", 160 pounds, has been looking good and might get the nod there.

Most of these will probably be going both ways for the Tigers, but two more lettermen, Tony Stewart and Greg Hensley, both 5' 10", 150 pounds, will play vital roles in the defensive secondary for Rosman. Sophomore Ricky Fangle has also been looking good in the defensive backfield.

An usual depth is the problem that the Tigers have to overcome. If they can keep all of their key personnel well, they'll likely give their opposition all they can handle on most occasions this fall.
