University Women Member Puts Brevard "On The Map" In Dallas

Mrs. Vasant D. Chapnerkar of Brevard recently attended the Biennial Convention of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) meeting at the Memorial Auditorium in Dallas, Texas. As the local representative, she was allowed to put Brevard "on the Convention map."

The AAUW convention drew delegates and members from all 60 states with 500 branches represented and a total of 1760 members registered. Mrs. Chapnerkar, who is the wife of Dr. V. D. Chapnerkar, Director of Fundamental Research at Olin, is Vice-president and Program Development Chairman of the Brevard Branch of AAUW. She also represented the state of North Carolina in her capacity as Chairman of Cultural Affairs in the state organization.

"It was a thrilling experience for me and a boost for my professional ability," says Mrs. Chapnerkar.

In the convention activities, the members and delegates debated a series of resolutions covering such controversial items as abortion, the death penalty, military appropriations and the Vietnam War. Mrs. Chapnerkar reports, Dr. Harvey Wheeler, Senior Fellow of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions, set the debate for the convention theme: "Reform, Revolution - Status Quo."

Dr. Wheeler told the members that the U. S. is in the midst of a revolutionary period when the traditional methods of resolving crises no longer work. He predicted that revolution may be achieved peacefully if leaders of protest and theoreticians of the scientific innovation form a liaison. He said the ecology movement is providing a staging ground for such an accommodation.

The convention also considered a Legislative Program that would guide the legislative action to be taken by AAUW in the next two years. There was also proposed and passed almost unanimously, a resolution to raise \$10 million for an endowment fund to commemorate the Association's centennial in 1982.

Mrs. Chapnerkar had Brevard "put on" the convention map of the U. S. and signed her name under it, showing it was represented. She also reports meeting Mrs. George Thomas at the meeting. Mrs. Thomas is originally from Brevard and was a classmate of Mrs. John I. Anderson, wife of the Brevard newspaper editor.

"Mrs. Thomas was so friendly," says Mrs. Chapnerkar, "that I felt like I had met some friend from my native India."

After returning from Dallas, Mrs. Chapnerkar received notification that she had won an award for being "the

most active, intelligent, vigorous, humorous, and informative International Member. Mrs. Chapnerkar is also a member of the International Federation of University Women.

Mrs. Chapnerkar has asked that her appreciation be expressed to the Brevard Branch of AAUW for allowing her to represent the local group.

Says Mrs. Chapnerkar also: "If anyone wants to do something about Pollution, Crisis in Public Education, Better Use of the Courts and the High Prices to the Consumer, the AAUW in Brevard is concerned and ready for action."

"If you'd like to learn how to stretch your dollar, get better goods and services from the money you spend, this is one of the four major areas of study by AAUW. If you want the government to be more responsive to the needs and wishes of the people, this is also one of the areas of study."

To Aid the Desperate

MY WIFE has cancer which has spread over her body. She is not sick enough to go to a hospital. I don't know how I can continue to take care of her and two teen-aged children and still make a living. Are there any facilities to which I can apply to help me?

Dear Mr. C.:
Such desperate situations as yours constantly come to the attention of doctors, social service workers, and religious advisors.

These are combinations of medical and socio-economic problems which need coordinated efforts by many people. Cancer Care, a dedicated organization was originated to fill the void in the many families in similar circumstances. Located at 1 Park Avenue in New York City, Cancer Care devotes itself to bridging difficult emotional and medical periods and brings in some semblance of comfort to patient and family.

My daughter is married and recently has been told that she has endometriosis. She is sure that surgery is lying in her

Dear Mrs. W.:
Your daughter's problem is complicated by, first, her physical condition, and second, her anxiety about it.

Endometriosis is a condition whose cause is yet unknown even though many theories exist. The lining of the uterus is called the endometrium. Occasionally the cells in this lining are implanted in other areas that surround the female organs. They may be found on the outer surface of the womb, on the ovaries, the Fallopian tubes, and even around the lower intestines.

For clarity of the record, these are not cancer. They do not cause cancer.

Your daughter must be assured and reassured about the nonmalignant character of this disease. It may take a concerted effort of her doctor, her gynecologist, even a psychiatrist to replace her fear with a feeling of encouragement and hope. You, the family, cannot do this alone—you may even need guidance on how to give her the emotional security she needs.
