
Will Hold Ground-Breaking Ceremony For New Hospital On September 19th

Regarding the ceremony and the pledges to the "Fund For Your Life" campaign in which Transylvanians raised more than a million dollars, Mr. Dense issues the following statement:

"It has been two years since your fund-raising campaign, and the Trustees are happy to announce that contracts have been signed to start construction. We regret the many delays encountered in obtaining matching funds and receiving

approvals from the many governmental agencies.

"These contracts were signed even though all necessary funds are not available. Building costs have increased about 10%, and some anticipated revenue has not been received. At this time we are faced with a possible deficit of \$200,000. The project cost is \$2.960,963 while current funds from all sources, including your pledge, amount to \$2,760,889.

"Because of the urgent need for new medical facilities in the county, the Trustees have decided we must move ahead with the project in spite of this shortage of funds. As a result it may become necessary to ask you to extend your pledge for a short period of time to help meet these commitments if we are unable to secure funds from other sources.'
