Blue Devils Lead 42-7 At Halftime


Brevard's blitzing Blue Devils overcame a host of fumbles and penalties to whip a game but outmanned T.C. Roberson football squad 45-19 in the season opener for both schools last Friday night.

The Blue Devils bobbled the opening kickoff, held the Rams in check on their first series, and then scored on their second offensive play of the night on a brilliant 86-yard sideline sprint by Jacob Norman.

Stan Hudson kicked the first of his seven extra points, sending Brevard into a 7-0 lead with 8:25 remaining in the first quarter.

The "Big Blue Machine" then unleashed all of its offensive power, scoring the next five times that it had ball possession in the first half. The Denny Griffin led Blue Devils scored twice more in the first period and three times in the second frame to lead 42-7 at halftime.
