Peanut Butter And Jelly Reach New Glory In The 'Love' Sandwich

Can anything be better than a plain peanut butter and jelly sandwich?

Ask some young or old fans of that longtime favorite sandwich combination and it's likely they will nod and give you a two-word answer: "Grill it."

The idea of serving hot peanut butter and jelly sandwiches came out of Alabama and Georgia, where farm families in the Southeastern peanut belt found that grilling the peanut butter and jelly sandwich intensified the flavor and aroma.

Now the hot idea has gained some added virtues in a recipe developed by home economists of the Kraft Kitchens. After spreading soft margarine on the outside of the peanut butter and jelly sandwich, they suggest dipping it in an egg and milk mixture before grilling. The result is everything one could ask of a sandwich: inviting aroma and golden brown appearance, rich flavor and good nutritional values.

"Peanut Butter Is Love . . . Spread Some Around Today," proclaims a new pop art poster. With so much going for it this recipe naturally qualifies for the name: "The Love Sandwich."

Grilled Peanut Butter And Jelly Love Sandwich (makes four sandwiches)

5 slices white bread Soft margarine
Peanut butter 2 eggs, beaten
Grape jelly or 1/4 cup milk
strawberry preserves

For each sandwich spread one slice of bread with peanut butter; top with second slice that is spread with jelly. Spread top and bottom of sandwich with soft margarine. Dip in combined egg and milk mixture. Grill on both sides until lightly browned.

Built-In Vacuum Swallows Pollution
