For this was the occasion when the last payment was made on an \$11,000 mortgage the final 20 percent of the debt incurred with the building of a new church to replace the old

since 1887.

Following the Homecoming message by the pastor, the Reverend Kenneth E. Bragg, and before a large Homecoming audience, Jerry Jerome, Sr., of Brevard Federal Savings and Loan Association, accepted a final check from church Treasurer, Mrs. A. C. Waldrop, and handed over the mortgage document for burning.

"The mortgage burning," said the Rev. Bragg, "proves the truth of the old saying, Where there's a will, there's a way'; and shows the results that can be achieved with the application of another phrase from the Scriptures, 'They had a mind to work.' "



SENATOR HOLLINGS **MUST LOWER SIGHTS**

Central Press Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON - Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., ended any hopes he had of landing the monthly set of landing the WASHINGTON - Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., ended any hopes he had of landing the second spot on the next year's Democratic presidential ticket when he took a new bride recently. Hollings, a racial moderate with a "New South" image, was divorced by his first wife of 24 years last November. They had four children, ranging in age from 11 to 20. After moderate Democratics scored impressive victories in southern elections last fall, Hollings was prominently mentioned as a vice presidential possibility on a ticket that would bring back the old Kennedy-Johnson East-South aris that has proved so successful for the Democratic Party in the past.
Hollings is best known here for his crusade against hunger and malnutrition among the poor. After launching hearings into that subject, he frankly admitted that he had ignored the problem as governor of South Carolina-a a confession that endeared him to Washington liberals.

ton liberals. He must slow down Hollings new wife had been on his staff since 1966. They were married in a large ceremony at The Citadel in Charleston. But she is a Catholic and a ranking eleric in the Charleston. Diocese had advised Catholics against attending the service be-cause of that church's opposition to divorce and remarriage. Because of the Democratic Party's past dependence on the Catholic vote in the industrialized states of the Northeast, a second marriage so close to the 1972 campaign will certainly knock him out of the vice presidential picture. The senator's position in South Carolina politics is not im-mediately endangered, however. He was re-elected to a six-year term in the Senate in 1968 and will not be up again until 1974. What affect his divorce and second marriage will have among his "Bible Belt" constituents cannot be accurately gauged as yet.
