



Labor Relations Board To Hold Hearing At Olin, 28th

The National Labor Rela-tions Board will meet in Brevard September 28 with Olin Corporation and United Pap-ermakers and Paperworkers Union (AFL-CIO) representatives to continue the hearing which took place yesterday, September 21, in Asheville.
