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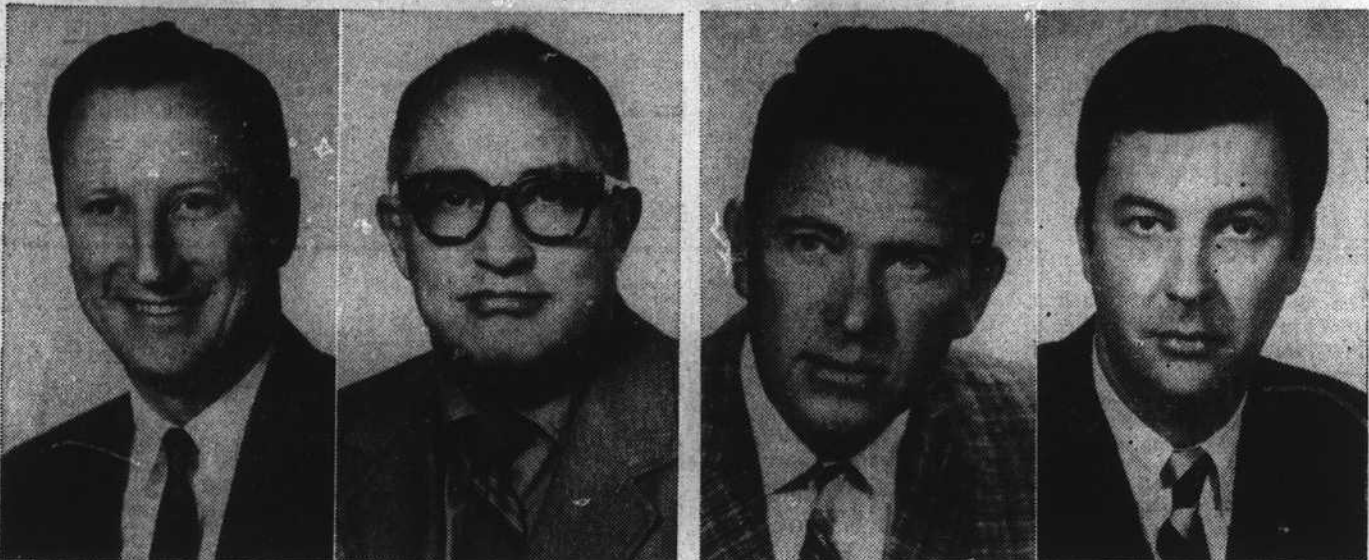

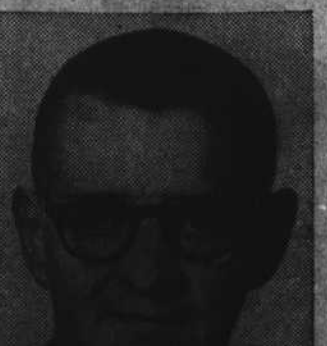

## Two Big Public Events Are Slated In Transylvania County Sunday

### To Break Ground At Hospital Site, Schenck Center Plans Dedication

Two outstanding events, to which the public is cordially invited, will be held in Transylvania county Sunday afternoon.

The first is the groundbreaking ceremony of the new Transylvania Community hospital and the other is the dedication of two new Dormitories at the Schenck Job Corps Center in beautiful Pisgah National Forest.

The hospital groundbreaking, weather permitting, will be held at 2:00 o'clock on the site off the Four-lane highway opposite Camp Straus, and the Dedication at the Schenck center is slated at 3:30.

Actually, the groundbreaking ceremony was scheduled last Sunday, but it was postponed because of the condition of the site after three days of heavy rains.

Ralph H. Ramsey, Jr., lifetime trustee, will be the Master of Ceremonies on the brief program at the groundbreaking ceremonies for the new hospital.

Jack C. Dense, chairman of the Board of Trustees, will speak briefly, and others on the program will include Dr. John Scroggin, the new Chief of Staff at the Hospital, and Mrs. William Dechant, President of the Women's Auxiliary.

Dr. Robert A. Davis, president of Brevard College, will give the invocation.

John W. Bailey, Administrator of the Transylvania Community hospital, will introduce persons on the platform and guests.

## Schenck Dedication

Two new dormitories at the Schenck Job Corps Center will be dedicated on Sunday, Sept. 26th, at 3:30 o'clock.

Following the dedication, there will be an "Open House".

The dormitories, each with a capacity of 56 corpsmen, replace four of the temporary trailer units that have been part of the center since the beginning. The new dormitories are of the latest type "pole" construction which is in harmony with the forest setting of the center.

### Seven Transylvania Seniors Are Semifinalist, National Merit Scholarship Program

Seven Transylvania high school seniors have been named Semifinalists in the 1971-72 National Merit Scholarship Program.

According to Principal William H. Stanley, the six students at Brevard high school who are semifinalists are: John Bohan, George Cline, Karen English, Sara Lea, Stephen Morgan and Olin Redman.

Principal Al Warren at Rosman high school announces that William J. Cathey,

III, is a semi-finalist there.

The approximately 15,000 Semifinalists appointed are among the nation's most intellectually talented high school seniors. They will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1972.

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST), which was given last February to more than 655,000 students in about 16,600 schools nation-

wide. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

The Semifinalists are representative of the country's most intellectually able young people, according to Edward C. Smith, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). "From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry, and the professions," he said.

## What 1% Pays

### Sales Tax Take For First Month In County: \$21,148

The treasury of Transylvania county was swelled to the tune of \$21,148.91 as a result of one-cent sales tax collections during the first month of the four-cent levy that was in effect here.

Euncombe - \$255,747

Jackson - \$24,184.

Macon - \$32,860

Madison - \$7,374

Swain - \$15,400

Total collections in the state for the 47 counties with the local tax was over \$3 million.

A report from the North Carolina Department of Revenue reflects the purchases during the month of July; the additional one-cent tax went into effect July 1st.

Returns on August sales were due in Raleigh last week, and this report will be out in about 30 days.

Based on the same ratio of sales the next 12 months, Transylvania will benefit by more than \$250,000.00 from the tax.

According to Donald Lee Moore, Chairman of the Transylvania County Board of Commissioners, the sales tax money is used for debt service and for schools.
