"Around the World" with special emphasis on visits to all sizes and types of temples in India, Kashmir, Afghanistan, Indonesia, Burma and the Philippines: The Book and Plate Club members made this interesting arm-chair adventure with Miss Ann Benson Priest as guide and tour director.

Some of the temples visited were: the beautiful and well preserved Taj Mahal, more a shrine, about 100 miles from Bombay and the temperature 114 degrees. The Emerald Temple in Thailand on the palace grounds where the royal family worships, and just one of the many in that fascinating country. The Golden Temple in Burma, perhaps one of the world's most beautiful. Not to be overlooked, the Temple of the Tooth - where just once a year "the tooth" is brought out, and of course they claim it to be one of Buddha's. All these countries have temples, but the Philippines

have the most beautiful churches.

Aside from temples the members thoroughly enjoyed a three day visit on a houseboat with a family of Cashmir. Miss Priest said she felt the rice terraces somewhat like the temples, some have been built for generations and they are still building them—lush green color and they give employment and food. Each country has its own special crafts, and the natives utilize their natural resources in every way possible.

As she guided her tour, Miss Priest showed many treasures from Asia: pottery, temple bells from Thailand and the Philippines, brass trays and betel nut chests, carved wood, oriental rug, laquer, Papier mache, skirt and blouse, silver anklets and jade.
