Eugene Coltrane Art Building To Be Dedicated September 30th

The newly - renovated art buiding on the campus of Brevard College here will be dedicated at 5:00 p. m. Soptember 30th in honor of the college's first president, the late Dr. Eugene J. Coltrane.

Among members of the executive committee of Brevard's Board of Trustees are Allen H. Sims, chairman of the board and alco chairman of the board of Citizens National Bank; Albert G. Myers, Jr., president of Textiles Inc.; and Cary C. Boshamer, president of Boshamer Inc., all of Gastonia.

Chairman Sims will present the building for dedication. Ceremonies will be held in connection with the fall meeting of Brevard's trustees.

Mrs. Isabel Doub Coltrane of Jamestown, widow of the man who arrived in the mountains of Western North Carolina in the middle of the great depression and propelled the fledging institution into the Twentieth Century, has just presented an art collection of more than 100 books and publications to the College as a memorial to Dr. Coltrane, who died in 1960.

Dr. Robert A. Davis, president of Brevard College, says, "It is entirely fitting that the Art Building bear the name of this first president of the College. The sound work of

Dr. Coltrane during his 16 years as president laid the foundation upon which our strong academic program now stands. The spirit of this outstanding educator still inspires the leadership of Brevard College as we seek to combine knowledge with moral and spiritual values."

Dr. Coltrane arrived at Brevard with insufficient funds, inadequate equipment and an uncertain future facing the institution, created in 1933 from Weaver and Rutherford Colleges on the grounds of the old **Prevard** Institute.

The nearly 400 students used dishes and pans borrowed from a summer camp, some of them slept in townspeoples homes, and students and faculty alike pitched in to help build and maintain the school during those early ycars.

Dr. Coltrane, the son of Quakers who believed in simplicity in daily living and a love of learning, instituted a plan by which students could college expenses by earn working nine weeks per year at anything from dishwashing to farm labor.

He also attracted a faculty that worked, at times, for less money than day laborers were making; and, when he retired, the \$150,000 physical plant and about \$60,000 endowment had grown to more than \$750,000 with a \$500,000 endowment.

Brevard is a two year liberal arts College related to the United Methodist Church of Western North Carolina. It's program prepares academic students in the sciences, liberal arts, fine arts and secretarial fields.
