Winners In Roadside Contest Will Be Announced On Friday

Area winners of the Roadside Improvement Contest of the 1971 Western North Carolina Development Program will be announced at a luncheon meeting on Friday, September 24 at 12 noon at Bailey's Cafeteria, Westgate Shopping Center, Asheville.

Fifty-nine organized rural communities competed in the special Roadside Contest this year and 12 county winners were judged in area competition last week. Cedar Mountain represented Transylvania county in the judging.

The presentation of awards in the rural beautification program will be made in conjunction with a planning meeting of the area improvement program's Steering Committee representing the western counties.

The committee, which is composed of members from the counties participating in the WNC Community Development

Program, will set up the schedule for area judging of the overall program later this fall and also make plans and set the awards schedule for the 1972 contest.

The rural roadside beautification contest is sponsored annually by the Asheville Agricultural Development Council and the agricultural agencies and local sponsors in the western counties. Purpose is to stimulate organized efforts by community clubs in clean-up and beautification projects and to recognize those doing the best job on a year-round basis.

First prize of \$150 in the contest will be awarded by ADOA Corporation of Biltmore. Second prize of \$100 will be given by the Coca-Cola Bottling Company and \$50 third prize by Ivey's. Four honorable mention awards of \$25 each are sponsored by Gerber Products Company and Asheville Federal Savings & Loan Association.

Beekeepers Meeting

The Transylvania County Beekeepers Association will meet Tuesday, September 20th, 7:30 p. m., at First Citizens Bank and Trust Company in Brevard. The election of officers and beekeeping hints for the winter months are the two main topics to be covered.

Open House - N.C.S.U.

Soil Tests

Now is a good time to get soil samples from fields to be planted next year. Also this applies for lawns and home gardens. Samples submitted now will be returned in time for growers to make necessary lime applications when land is prepared for cover crops.

Fall application of lime allows for neutralization of soil acidity and removal of aluminum which reacts to phosphorus and reduces its efficiency. Therefore, lime applied as soon as possible will result in more efficient utilization of phosphorus applied next spring.
