Hollywood Star Eddie Albert Visits At Connetsee Falls

Stage, movie, and television star Eddie Albert thinks Connetsee Falls is "beautiful, unspoiled and unpolluted." He likes the Brevard recreational residential community, now under construction so well, he plans to build a home here himself.

Here to make a promotional film for the new community, Mr. Albert was lavish in his praise of Connetsee and Western North Carolina.

All but Youngblood are out on bonds of \$2,500 each, ac-

ording to Sheriff Hubbard.

He also reports that Osborne and Edwards were arrested on warrants from private persons.

True bills of indictment were returned by the Grand Jury on John Macfie, Vickie Bentley, James Macfie and Billy Youngblood.

Sheriff Hubbard says the group will be tried in the next term of Superior Court in Transylvania.
